




One of the Chancellor's Strategic Imperatives is to update the team culture and structure, moving the voices of students, faculty, and staff members to the center of deliberations on redesign and improvement projects. Form teams to participate in redesign projects and prepare recommendations for implementation, including the Chancellor's Strategic Imperatives. Links to goals of strategic plan: goal 3, objectives 2 and 4; goal 4, objective 3.

I recently co-authored with Dr. Gunder Myran, senior assistant to the chancellor for strategic initiatives, a chapter in a book co-edited by George Boggs and our friend and colleague, Dr. Christine Johnson McPhail, entitled <u>Team Leadership for Community Colleges</u> (Stylus Publishing, 2020). The title of our chapter is "Team Leadership in the Urban Community College." This chapter examines the role of team leadership (also known as collaborative, distributive, collective, or shared leadership) as an increasingly important role of administrative and faculty leaders as they collaborate with students, faculty, staff, and community constituencies in seeking solutions to large-scale, enterprise-level challenges.

A team-based structure is a part of the organizational design of WCCCD which has two major elements: the "vertical" structure, such as the hierarchical administrative structure and the academic structure, and the "horizontal" structure comprised of teams and committees that cut across the traditional hierarchical structures. Many types of teams at WCCCD and other community colleges have their appropriate and useful place: committees of the board of trustees, the executive team of the chancellor or president, and the teams of academic departments and administrative units. Although these functional teams continue to be an important dimension of governance and decision-making, the emerging collaborative leadership model places more emphasis on cross-functional teams that engage students, faculty and staff, and community constituencies in redesign projects that have an impact at the enterprise or district level and shape the future of the college as a whole.

WCCCD is becoming a collaborative college (creating a participative and team-based culture) and an enterprising college (keen to become future thinkers and undertake initiatives of magnitude, complexity, and risk). As we move forward, I envision increased efforts to move the voices of our students, faculty, and staff to the center of deliberations on redesign and improvement projects. We will build on our excellent current work such the guided pathways project, various student success initiatives, the academic master plan, and the rethink developmental education team.



WCCCD Partners with Cleary University on an Accelerated Pathway to BBA in Diversity and Leadership for Staff

WCCCD has partnered with Cleary University to offer staff an accelerated pathway toward earning a bachelor's degree in as little as one year.* Staff can earn up to 90 credits for prior coursework and work-life experience, and after scholarships, can expect to pay no more than \$5,000 including tuition, fees and books with 90 credits transferred.

An information session will be held in early September; more details to follow. The fall semester begins September 25, 2023 with six-week classes and a flexible in-person and online classroom experience.

*Employee costs could be lower depending on federal and state financial aid awards. FAFSA completion is required. Assuming degree completion in one year passing all classes.




Farmington Hills Fire Department Training

Community members enjoyed hustle class where they learned the latest steps of the classic line dance.


The Health and Wellness Education Center hosted a special Back to School event featuring actor and comedian Nick Cannon.

Trenton High School offers a wide variety of career paths for students


Trenton High School (THS) Career and Technical Education Program (CTE)

During the 2023-2024 school year, we are planning to continue to strengthen our "in house" Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses by advocating for funds from state and federal grants, to continue to fulfill program equipment needs in all programs. The programs that they offer inlcude: Graphic Design, Marketing, WoodTech, Auto Tech, Digital Media and Criminal Justice (Dual Enrollment Program offered through Wayne County Community College District-Taylor where students can earn up to 24 college credit hours over a two-year period).




