Chancellor's Strategic Imperatives for the Long-term Future of WCCCD

The subject of this article is the strategic imperative to advance technology as a force for institutional transformation, making WCCCD a digital enterprise. The digital transformation of higher education, and of WCCCD specifically, is progressing even faster than we could have imagined. The COVID-19 pandemic gave us no choice but to rapidly expedite our uses of teaching and learning technologies, increase faculty and staff digital competence, and adapt technology-supported institutional operations, thus accelerating the digital transformation that was already underway prior to the pandemic.

At WCCCD, this acceleration is taking place in two dimensions: (1) changes in career education and workforce development programming as the world of work transforms to embrace the digital jobs of the future and as individuals, machines, and software learn to work together (in occupations such as robotics, mechatronics, advanced manufacturing, digital/media communications, digital technology, media design, digital equipment technology, and web design), and (2) changes in WCCCD as a digital enterprise. The digital transformation is transforming not only our career and workforce development programming, but also WCCCD as a digital enterprise. We are challenged to become "future thinkers" as we learn how to work together as a faculty and staff in a hybrid in-person/remote work environment, adapt our instructional design (such as virtual learning modalities, digitally-based pedagogies, online teaching/learning processes, and instructional design), increase faculty and staff digital competence through professional development, and modify our structures and processes to embrace analytics and data-informed decision-making. This second dimension of our digital transformation is the focus of this Chancellor's Strategic Imperative:

Advance technology as a force for institutional transformation, making WCCCD a digital enterprise in areas such as faculty and staff digital competence, teaching and learning technologies, data-based student learning outcomes assessment, analytics, and data-informed decision-making. 

The TriBeta Biological Society hosted its fall induction ceremony. Participants were given information regarding requirements for new members of the organization.







Staff continue to reach out to students regarding the benefits of the TRiO Program.




GED Program

In an effort to encourage, challenge, and improve our students' critical thinking skills, staff is conducting a series of workshops with one being entitled "Critical Thinking Game Day."








Chancellor's High School Leadership Institute






What's Trending: Motivations for Enrolling

How to Turn a Huge Goal into Something Even Bigger

Dr. Bryan Huffman is an ophthalmologist in Holland, Michigan who recently accomplished his goal of swimming across the English Channel. While the shortest distance across is 22 miles, because of currents and weather conditions, his path was 37 miles. That was an extraordinary accomplishment, and he has shared details of how he succeeded.

Dr. Huffman emphasizes the four P's for his success: preparation, practice, perseverance, and prayer/people. On October 11, 2022 the water temperature was 64 degrees with 45 degrees air temperature. Official rules stipulate no wet suit is allowed because that could add 15-20% to the swimmer's speed. There was always a dinghy close by, and there was also a larger boat nearby to provide periodic food breaks to prevent depleting his glucose.

While he had significant nausea and threw up his food several times during the 12 hours and 19 minutes of the swim, he made it successfully despite being 100% certain he would not make it during his lowest periods.

Bryan has set a new goal to raise money for children's swim lessons by swimming all five Great Lakes. The number one cause of death for children 1-4 years old is drowning, and a single swim lesson can reduce the incidence of drowning by 88%. This is a great example of expanding a huge, personal goal into something that will benefit many, many young people and will save lives.


