
Navigating Careers and Workforce Through Guided Pathways



Thailand Bamboo School

WCCCD's During Study **Abroad** educational experience to Thailand's Bamboo School in Fall 2024, our students were so moved by the condition of the children at the Bamboo School, that they rolled up their sleeves, grabbed the wheel barrows and shovels and began to perform community service. They moved concrete; shoveled dirt, and some even helped with carpentry. "The biggest need we have is arms to love the children physically," said Catherine Riley-Bryan, director of the institute. She said the school, which is celebrating its 24th founder's day, has seen more than 700 students come through. Each child has a story to tell. "One graduated as a doctor, 18 as nurses, 21 as teachers; four have started their own village orphanage, and eight have gone on to become pastors."





Bruce Ewen

Bruce Ewen started at WCCCD in 1971. Looking at his background prior to his time at the College makes it more understandable why he enjoys teaching so much and why he has so many life experiences to share.

Professor Ewen was a member of the United Steel Workers in Buffalo, N.Y., and he worked as a factory worker. He also worked there as a paralegal and as a community organizer. He put his degree in Economics from the University of Wisconsin to good use while working at the Department of Transportation as an economic analyst. Those experiences have helped provide countless 'real life experiences' to share in the classroom with his Introduction to Economics students.

He credits WCCCD for the opportunity over the past five years to showcase people who have made multicultural contributions throughout history. Together they share some results of their research high-lighting international cultures during their Wednesday lectures conducted virtually. Mr. Ewen also attends interfaith reflection site visits with faculty, staff, and community partners to cultural sites, museums, mosques, temples, and churches throughout the Detroit area.

Professor Ewen is growing and stretching himself to learn about international musical styles for his lectures. He is also learning to speak Arabic, and he is showcasing historical figures as he does more research on different cultures. He even uses Artificial Intelligence to help "summarize and organize his research and readings."

As he is now an octogenarian, he is thankful for the opportunities he has at WCCCD. He loves seeing his intellectual bandwidth expand through the opportunity he has each and every week.

This program educated caregivers on safe sleeping habits to prevent infant deaths and reduce the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).







Ted Scott staff have redesigned its program board. This board lists every program that WCCCD offers. Each programs has a QR link to the program




