




The Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education (MIPSE) hosted a Basic Pump Operations class, sponsored by the Wyandotte Fire Department.




Wayne RESA Growing Through Career Conversations






Smart Technology in Classrooms Upgrade Project

Shining the Light on...

James Jackson

James Jackson has been instrumental in creating one of the largest criminal justice programs in Michigan at WCCCD. He accomplished that and gives great credit to Dr. Ivery for his support in assembling his team.

Professor Jackson started at WCCCD in the early 1970's just after becoming a police officer in Detroit. He learned that the District was starting a Criminal Justice Program and was asked if he would like to be part of it. He did and began as a part-time instructor, rising through the ranks to become a full-time instructor after retiring from the Detroit Police Department.



Mr. Jackson became chairman of the Criminal Justice Program and has taught in the Caribbean, West Africa, and around the United States. He has done work for Michigan State University and Wayne State University, where he taught part-time.

His significant achievement has been assembling one of the best faculties in the country. The faculty members have great credentials and impressive practical experience, including former chiefs of Detroit and other police departments, the county executive, the Chief Judge of the District Court, numerous attorneys and judges, former Directors of the Michigan State Police, the CEO of Public Safety at UM, and the CEO of Public Safety at the Airport Authority.



Mr. Jackson believes the Criminal Justice Department has touched the lives of many people who ended up working in the field including several Chiefs of Police for Detroit and neighboring communities. Historically, WCCCD has been the largest producer of minority corrections officers in Michigan.

Mr. Jackson has worked on projects such as, curriculum, assessment, the college's art galleries, accreditation and other initiatives.


