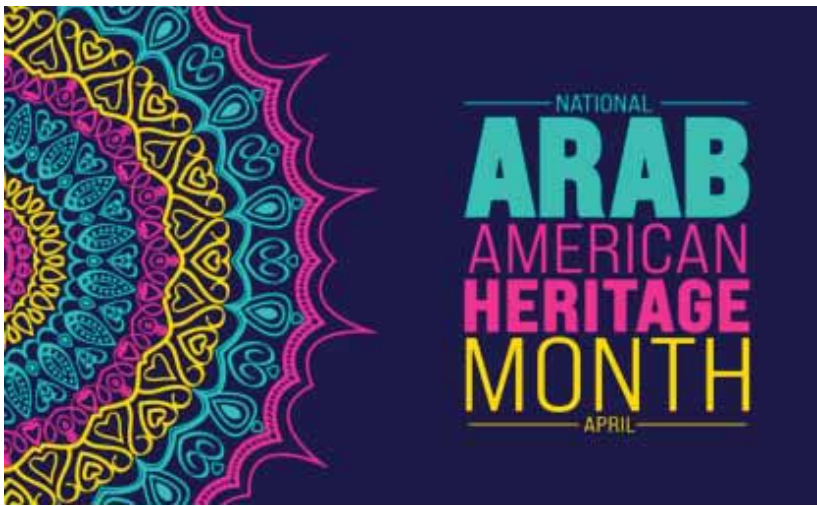
School district luncheon puts the 'unity' in community

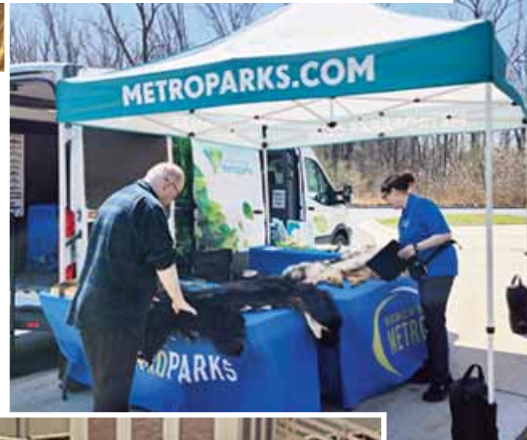

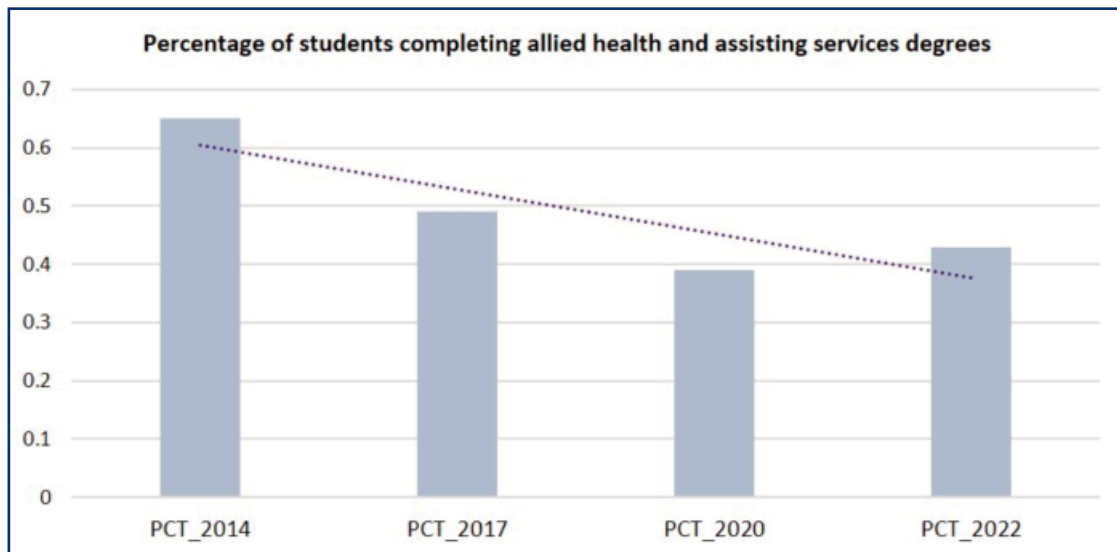

Institutional Effectiveness

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) continues environmental scans to identify workforce and labor market needs within the region. The labor market analysis is used to inform recruitment for career pathways and new program development. According to a Lightcast article entitled, “Healthcare Workforce: Beyond the Registered Nurse Shortage,” many health science employers mention challenges beyond nursing to include surgical techs, lab techs, MRI techs, respiratory therapists, and physician assistants. Lightcast reports degrees in these fields have been facing significant declines in completions.

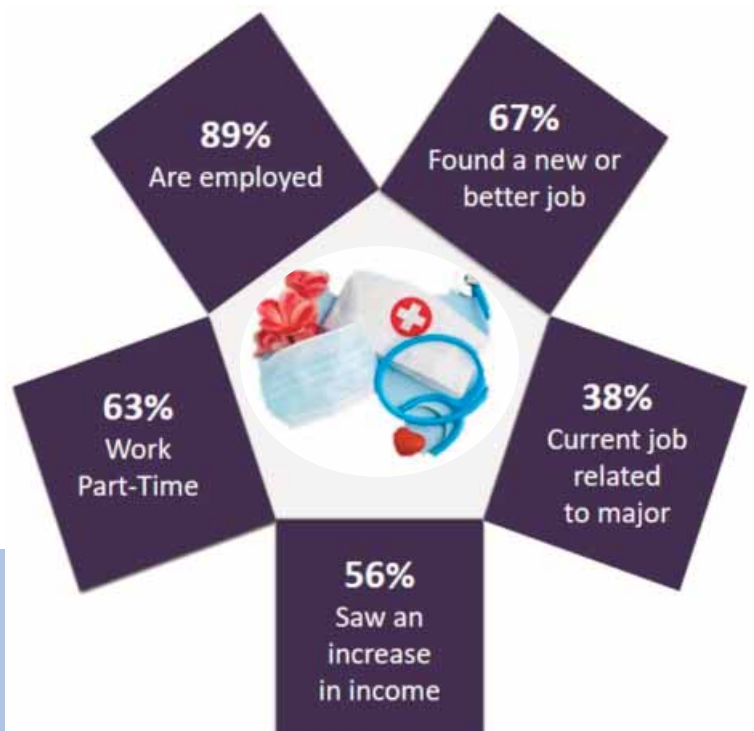

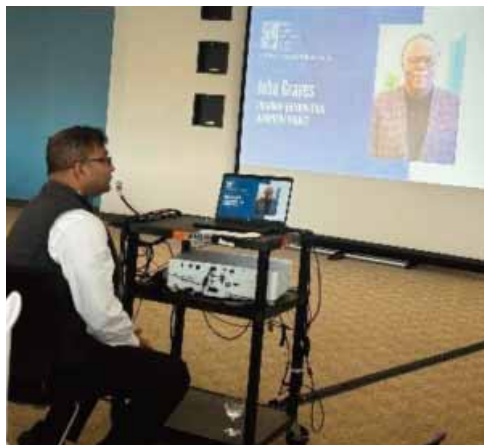
Microsoft 365 Orientation Session

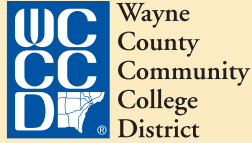

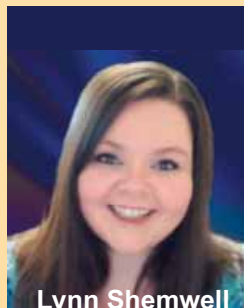

Shining the Light on...

Mike Dotson

Mike Dotson started at WCCCD in October, 1997 as a Senior Financial Analyst, and his career is a classic case of what good things can happen when people are given the support and opportunity to be successful.

Mr. Dotson served as the chief budget person and ran the Reimbursement Center for Financial Aid. Additionally he worked in campus operations for a time and was also involved with the Expansion Center, which became the spring board for what is now the Mary Ellen Stempfle University Center.

He served as Campus President of the Western Campus (now the Ted Scott Campus) for four years. That experience provided multiple opportunities to become active with the local communities. The Western Campus presidency prepared him with excellent experience in campus operations.

Then an opportunity arose to lead the Curtis L. Ivery Health and Wellness Education Center (HWECE) which opened to the public in 2022. Mr. Dotson's experience leading the HWECE unexpectedly developed into a microcosm of the College itself with the focus and mission of the College being applied to the people being served. He is always finding creative opportunities to meet students where they are, so the facility often serves as a safe space for many of its users.

Users of the HWECE include city council members, doctors, attorneys as well as students and staff. It now has over 1,200 members. That is a testament to the mission of the College and what is accomplished every day. There are now steam rooms and a recovery suite with massage chairs.

Mr. Dotson says the lesson learned from his experience is there are no limitations on what you can accomplish, and he credits Dr. Curtis Ivery for seeing potential in him that he did not recognize himself. The key ingredient is to do everything possible to be successful, and he is working to provide others with that opportunity.
