Each member deliberated important details from their strategic initiatives and proposed budget needs to fulfill the college mission and vision for the fiscal year. Ms. DiCaro, Mr. Ahmed and Dr. Hodge guided each hearing according to key future-shaping objectives to include:

1. Professional Staffing Infrastructure and Strengths
2. New Program Development
3. Institutional and Program Accreditation
4. Technological Advancement
5. Program Marketing and Recruitment
6. Enrollment and Retention Improvement
7. Facility and Campus Restoration

I will lead the Council in final reviews of the budget hearing outcomes to determine next steps with Ms. DiCaro to prepare the 2025/26 budget proposal for approval by the Board of Trustees.

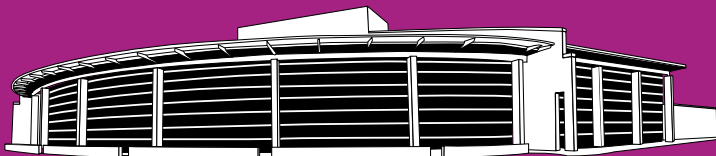

This week's Lunch and Learn session focused on how bees make honey. Participants learned about the world of urban beekeeping and the fascinating process of honey production.

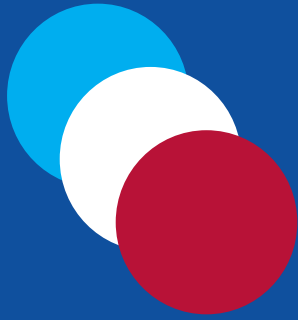

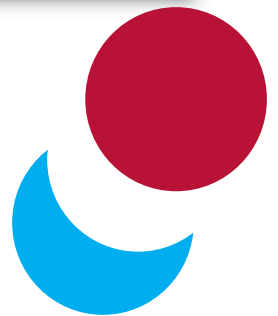

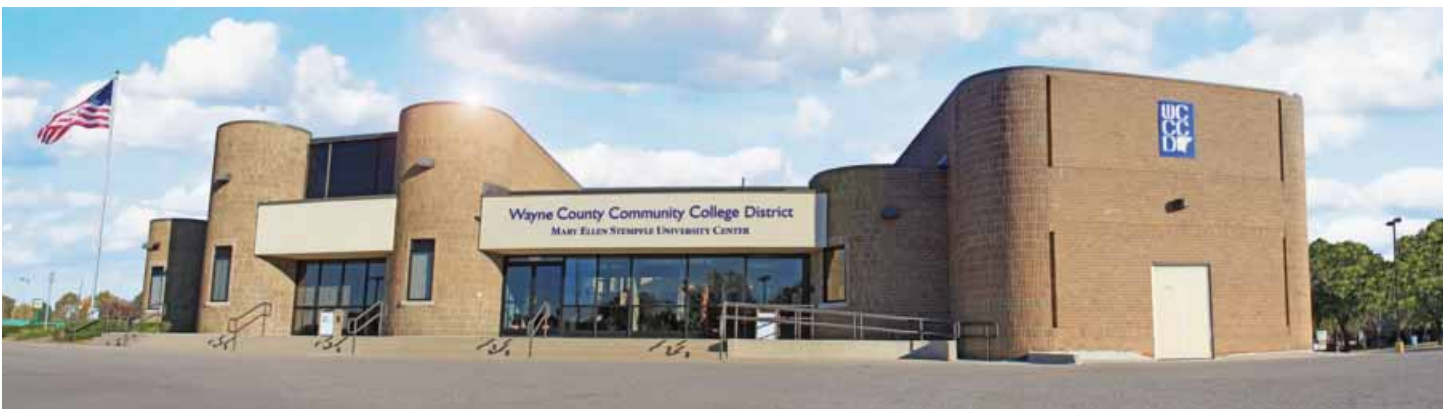
