

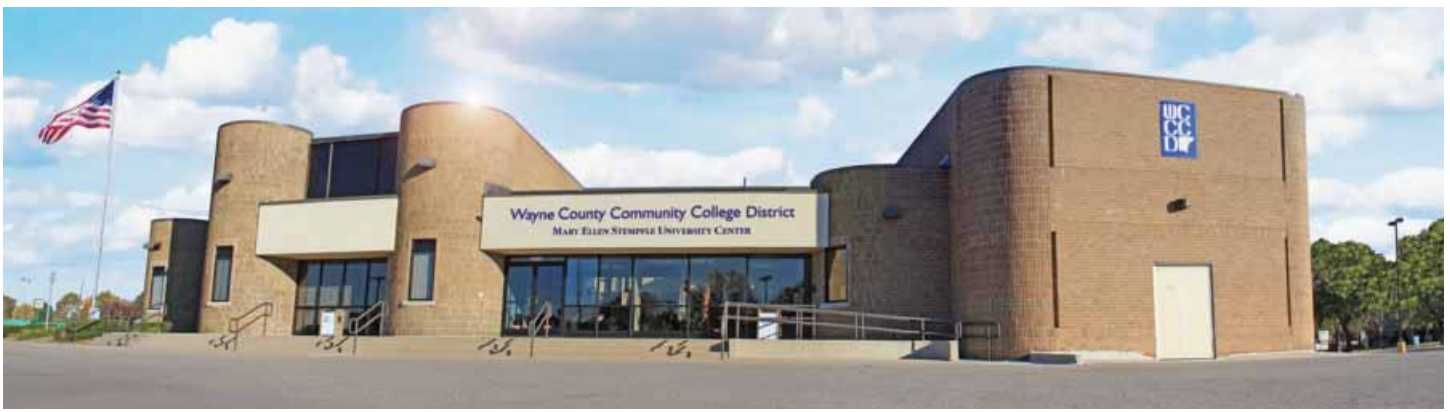
2025 Honors Convocation

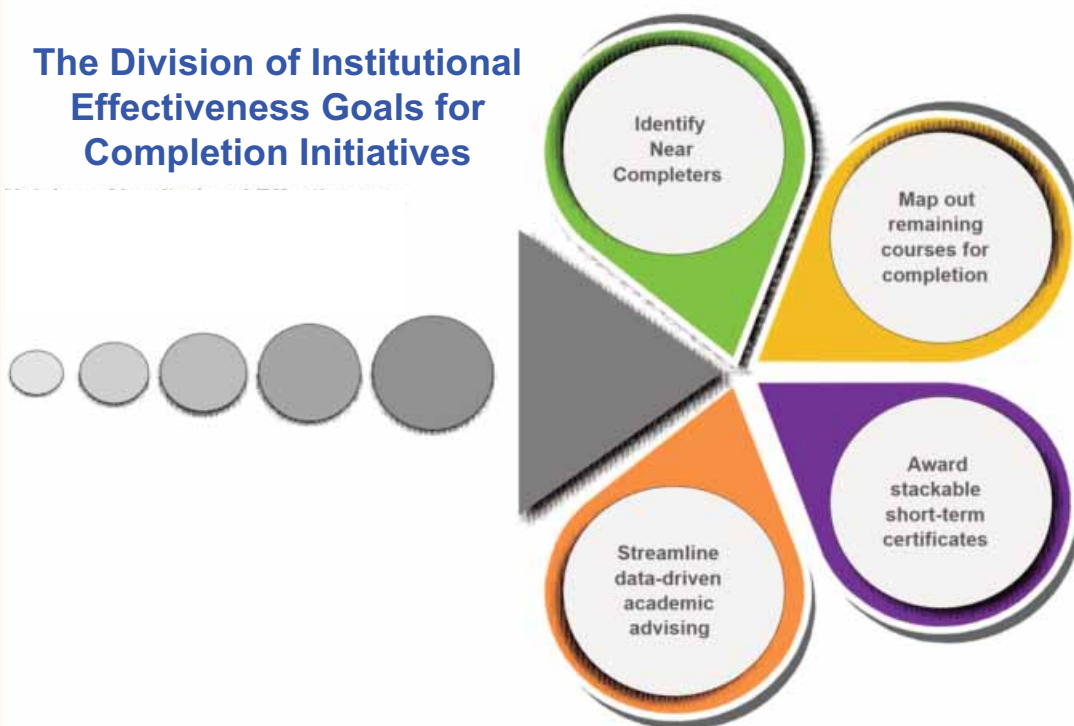
Institutional Effectiveness

Connecting Minority Communities Grant *Project Update*

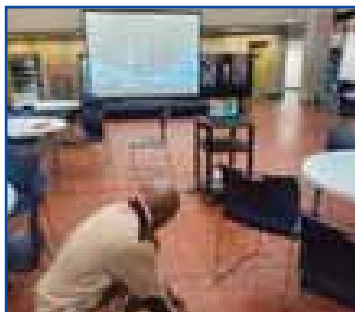

This comprehensive program provides students with the knowledge and practical skills necessary to perform residential home inspections in accordance with industry standards and state regulations.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW:
Through a blend of classroom instruction, real-world case studies, and hands-on practice, students will learn to assess the structural, electrical, HVAC, plumbing, and roofing systems of residential properties. The program also covers key topics such as report writing, communication with clients, building codes, and ethical practices.

Home inspections can help prevent buyers from facing costly repairs or replacements after closing, according to Consumers Credit Union.

Participants identified three practical ways genealogy can be applied to everyday life, including health, legal and cultural contexts.

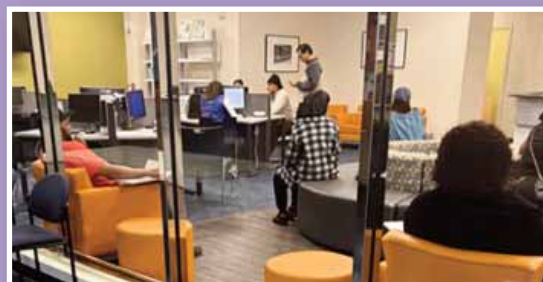

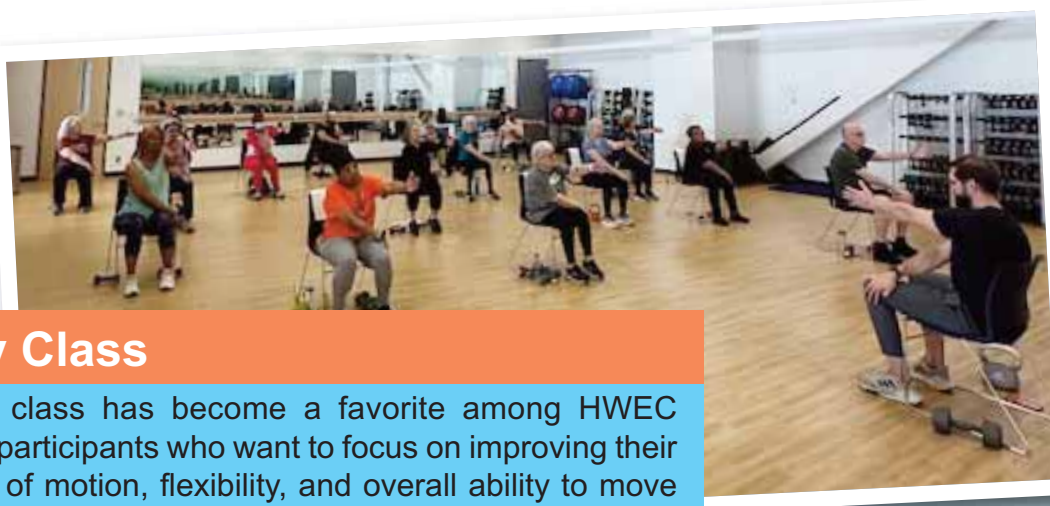
