

Literacy Day 2025 Inspires Young Readers

The Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus and The Bookworm Club, in collaboration with WCCCD's School of Continuing Education, took Literacy Day 2025 to the students at Cesar Chavez Lower Elementary School. More than 500 Pre-K through 6th grade students participated in a wide range of activities and educational games. The event, designed to foster a love for reading and improve literacy skills for early learners, provided each of the children with a new book, backpack and school supplies to keep them reading over the summer months. Since its inception, The Bookworm Club has placed books in the hands of nearly 150,000 children—many of whom may not have otherwise had access to these vital

resources. This effort continues to spark a love of reading and open doors to learning for countless young

minds.





Institutional Effectiveness

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness reviews student demographics and characteristics in preparation for the incoming student body for Fall 2025. In partnership with WCCCD, Detroit Fire Department announces first department-run paramedic class

The Detroit Fire Department (DFD) has launched its first-ever department-run paramedic training class in partnership with WCCCD, marking a historic investment in the future of emergency medical services in the city.

Unlike traditional paramedic programs, which require firefighters to train on their own time and at their own expense, Detroit's in-house course pays current EMT-certified firefighters to complete their training on duty. The department is excited to offer a paid, department-led pathway to paramedic certification—an initiative which can serve as a potential model for others across the state and beyond.

The Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the EMS Professions (CoAEMSP) for the Commission of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP) accreditation is required to run an advanced paramedic class and can be difficult to attain for many institutions. This challenge was overcome thanks to a partnership between Wayne County Community College District and the Detroit Fire Department, allowing the DFD Regional Training Center to become an authorized WCCCD Alternate Education Center for paramedicine. Through the agreement, members of the Detroit Fire Department are now able to receive college credits for their Fire and EMS certifications and fast-track them to an associate degree in applied science.







University of Bethlehem Tour and Best Practice Visit






Professional Development
