District Police Authority






Professional Development






Staff continue to process dual enrollment applications for the Summer 2025 semester.


The Office of Facilities Planning and Management serves the District by developing and maintaining clean, safe, functional, and attractive campuses. This office has a diverse range of functions. Some include:


