




Shining the Light on... Matthew Puwal



Matthew Puwal began his tenure at WCCCD in 2003 working in project management with our phone system, and he now serves as the Dean for Career Programs for the Eastern Campus. Being a 'hands-on' person, Matt has experience in working with courses in most career programs. He is in fact so hands-on that he did his own geothermal technology work in constructing his personal home.





Matt is also proud to share that the College now has new equipment in CNC, 3-D Printing, and Welding that provides training well beyond what students will generally find in private industry when they are hired. And the training they gain at WCCCD enables them to work on any equipment in the field.

Perhaps the most exciting development in the Eastern Campus' Career Programs is the state-of-the art Mechatronics Lab, which trains robotics and automation technology technicians how to program robots. The training cell is the result of a partnership between WCCCD, Stellantis, Fanuc, and Comau. Those partners are all represented on the program's advisory committee. The training cell was specifically designed for WCCCD, and it contains nine robots and the technology behind what makes the robots function.



The goal is for the College to offer classes this Fall semester, and Matt will be taking an accelerated training program in the training cell to provide oversight.

District IT made major progress this week with the Office 365 migration.



This effort will enhance efficiency and collaboration, directly support staff at all campus locations and foster a more connected, productive work environment for serving our students.
















District Police Authority



Staff participated in the City of Detroit's Senior Summer Sizzler and provided attendees with information about the college's program offerings.




Student Support Services

The Dual Enrollment Team met to discuss Fall 2025 Semester course offerings.












New "Little Library" Initiative Supports Literacy
