


Students Return from **Educational Study Abroad Experience in Panama**





New Compensated Absences Requirement Meeting

Team members representing Accounting and Payroll met to discuss the new Compensated Absences (Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) 101) requirement, which will be reported in the financial statements for fiscal year 2025. GASB 101 requires government entities to recognize liabilities for both unused leave and leave that has been used but remains unpaid or unsettled at reporting dates. This represents an amendment to previous standards by creating a more comprehensive approach to leave liability recognition.

Network Infrastructure Upgrade Project Update – Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus



The network team has successfully completed the final network closet upgrade at the Curtis L. Ivery Downtown Campus. This particular closet played a critical role in supporting the Police Authority's camera systems, and the upgrade was strategically performed after work hours to minimize operational disruption.

The Northwest Campus has been identified as the next site scheduled for network infrastructure upgrades.

IT Security Updates

The WCCCD IT security team is working with top security vendors to improve the District's security, focusing on modern cloud platforms and cybersecurity best practices. Demonstrations have been conducted in critical areas:

- Advanced email filtering: To reduce phishing and spam.
- Identity threat protection: To detect and respond to threats.
- Robust password policy enforcement: To strengthen authentication.
- Awareness: To equip staff, faculty, and students with threat identification and response knowledge.

Shining the Light on...

Dr. Christian Nwamba

Dr. Christian Nwamba has been a professor at WCCCD where he has been teaching microbiology and introductory biology to students aspiring to become nurses, dental hygienists, surgical technicians, pharmacy technicians, physical therapy assistants, and many other allied health careers. He earned both a Master's and Ph.D. in biology with emphasis and research in molecular biology and virology at Wayne State University. He has a long list of publishing credits for his textbook reviews, and he received the WCCCD Exceptional Faculty Awards for 2013 and 2015.



Regarding what provides him with the greatest satisfaction in his teaching, he said "students who are willing to learn and then see them succeed." Dr. Nwamba is an advisory member of the WCCCD TriBeta Honors Biological Society, and he enjoys helping students learn to succeed in their educational endeavors and career pursuits.

Dr. Nwamba directs and guides undergraduate science students every summer in the Chancellor's sponsored Summer Water Research Project, using the Detroit River at Belle Isle as a sampling site. He coaches students in multiple poster presentation competitions at the local and national level, where they have won certificates of recognition in collaboration with Dr. Caryn Heldt of Michigan Technological University and Dr. Barbara Radecki, now retired. He has presented at the American Society for Engineering Education and the American Association of Community Colleges annual conference on the findings of his water research project.



Dr. Nwamba has served on many committees throughout the District to support academic excellence. He was just re-elected as the President of AFT local 2000, the WCCCD faculty union, a role he has served in since 2017.

While clearly a strong leader and contributor to all that is good about WCCCD, Dr. Christian Nwamba takes the position that he "does what he does quietly to help provide a continued improvement of community college educational experience for students and faculty."








VIRTUAL INTERCULTURAL CONVERSATIONS


DALNET Project Managers Meeting


