WCCCD TRiO students had the opportunity to explore Ferris State University's campus, experiencing its academic environment firsthand.



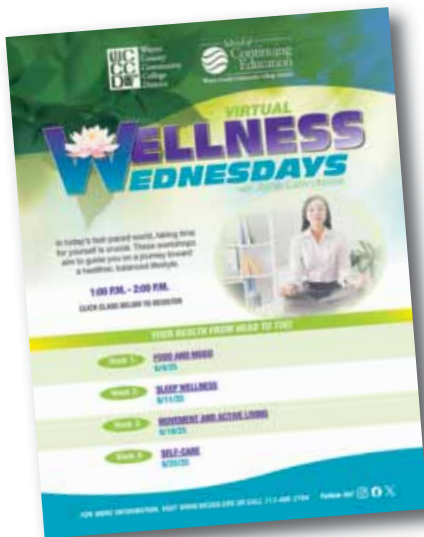

Honoring French American Heritage Month

Shining the Light on... **Anthony Arminiak**

Anthony Arminiak began his career with WCCCD in 1994 as the Program Director of EMT. He became Dean of Instruction at the Western Campus in 2001, and then Associate Vice Chancellor of Career Programs. He served as Downriver Campus President and Provost of the Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education from 2007-2018. Continuing his added responsibilities, he became Regional Campus President (Downriver and Ted Scott Campus/CAO and Provost MIPSE and Health Science Institute between 2018 until his retirement in 2022.

More important than all of Mr. Arminiak's duties and responsibilities are the services provided to students and the community over all those years. Clients have included the Wayne County Sheriff's Office (the biggest client on site for 20 years), The FBI, Customs and Border Patrol, the U.S. Attorney General, Fermi II, BASF, Marathon Oil, Wayne County Public Works, and the Downriver SWAT Team to name a few.

Being responsible for providing competent training to all those clients also means Mr. Arminiak had to have the training and skills necessary to achieve that competence. He is a State of Michigan Licensed Paramedic, Emergency Medical Service Instructor Coordinator, and Respiratory Therapist. He also holds national certifications as a Respiratory Therapy Technician and CPR for Healthcare Provider.

He has also provided program accreditation oversight for Practical Nurse and Certified Nurse Assistant, Michigan Fire Fighter I and II Certification, State of Michigan EMS Provider Certification, Paramedic, and the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence.

He earned an AAS Degree in Respiratory Therapy from Washtenaw Community College; a BS in Allied Health, Respiratory Therapy from Siena Heights College; and a Master of Science in Administration from Central Michigan University.

Mr. Arminiak served as the college's COVID-19 District Director where he developed and implemented safety protocols, worked with governmental agencies, ensured compliance with all regulations and laws, and provided an assessment for all COVID-19 contacts for proper documentation throughout the entire process.

Mr. Arminiak continues to provide competent community support by representing the Chancellor at Downriver and Western Wayne County events and activities.

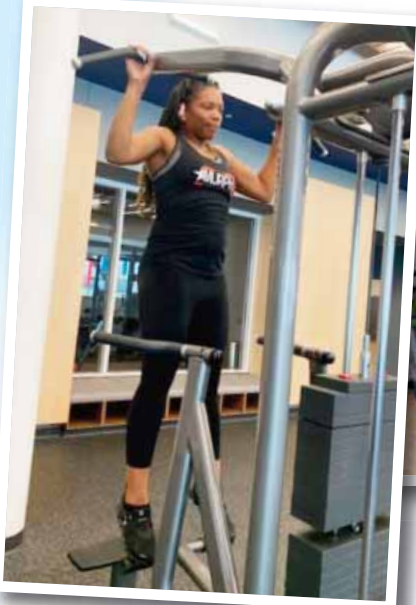
The Health Sciences team organized a Game Day event for students, faculty, and staff. This was an opportunity to unwind, promote work-life balance, and foster community engagement.

My passion for computer science began with my early curiosity about how technology works and has only deepened over time. With over 18+ years of industry experience and a Master's Degree in Computer Science, I've been fortunate to work on cutting-edge solutions in healthcare technology. Currently pursuing my Ph.D. in Computer Science at Wayne State University, my work continues to fuel my enthusiasm for research, innovation, and mentoring the next generation of technologists.

Research/Professional Interests:

My primary research interests lie in Artificial Intelligence, particularly in the areas of Agent AI, healthcare applications, and real-time decision-making systems. - Despite a busy professional life, I find great fulfillment in teaching and mentoring students, which is why I continue to teach part-time at WCCCD while serving as a full-time Director of Engineering at LSPedia.

The Ted Scott Campus hosted a Practical Nursing Education (PNE) orientation and registration workshop. Participants were provided an overview of the program and career opportunities available.

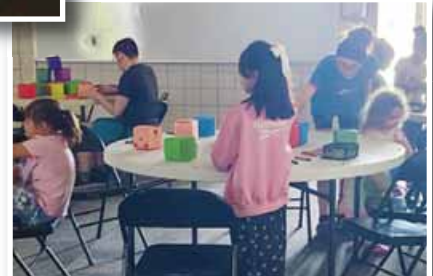
Boat America Safety Workshop
