






Institutional Effectiveness

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness gathers data and insight from new and returning students to better understand ways to support campus service navigation and success. The Student First Survey is used during Welcome Week on each campus to gather feedback on service usage and needs to improve learning experiences. Welcome Week is strategically offered after the three weeks after the start of classes to help students discover support services, promote retention and course completion. Below provides a snapshot of survey outcomes related to characteristics, interests and service usage.

Shining the Light on... Dr. Johnesa Hodge

Dr. Johnesa Hodge began her work with WCCCD in 2007 as the Dean of Institutional Effectiveness. Since that time, she transitioned to serve as Vice Chancellor of Institutional Effectiveness and Research and has amassed an impressive array of achievements in the realm of data analysis, research, accreditation, reporting, and strategic planning.

Looking at her degrees from University of Michigan (UM) in biopsychology and cognitive sciences, Master of Social Work, and her doctorate from Walden University in organizational research, assessment and evaluation, it was clear her contribution to WCCCD was going to be something significant given her preparation and professional experience in human services.

Starting an entry-level job in data management and clinical studies at the UM hospital focused on pediatric cancer research, Dr. Hodge later transitioned to Marygrove College where she led a 10-year reaffirmation of accreditation with the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). She used that experience to help WCCCD prepare for its 2010 site visit curating the self-study and critical evidence to meet HLC criteria. She has continued to contribute to the District's accreditation reputation with no findings in 2010, 2020 and 2024. Both her accreditation experience and service for the Higher Learning Commission Peer Corp continue to support WCCCD and contribute to the District's continuous improvement success.

Beyond accreditation efforts, Dr. Hodge has been instrumental in completing environmental scans, strategic plans, economic impact studies, and broadening the use of data and reporting compliance to federal, state, local and regional agencies. Data analysis in the Institutional Effectiveness Office leads to decision-making to improve program effectiveness, completion initiatives, development of new programs and services, recruitment, and marketing.

Dr. Hodge led the last Economic Impact Study focusing on economic growth and the College's operational effectiveness. It examined the College's impact on students, on the community, and on taxpayers. The data was used to determine how the College could improve and determined the return on investment (ROI) for students.

The Economic Impact Study has been a critical document for WCCCD in demonstrating the difference WCCCD makes to the community and the impact on our students' quality of life. Despite the changing socio-economic region, WCCCD has awarded nearly 20,000 graduates with degrees and certificates in the last 10 years. The study yielded clear economic data showing for every \$1 spent on educating students, they will experience a 22.6% annual return on their investment.

While Institutional Effectiveness and Research focuses on data and trend analysis for external compliance to federal and state agencies, the Office looks at a broader perspective including planning and analytics to support the Chancellor's Annual Action Priorities. Dr. Hodge provides leadership and insight for development of key performance indicators (KPI), dashboards, survey research, program assessment plans, and planning outcomes reports. One of the most important uses of data from IE is the work on continuous quality improvement. IE provides guidance to ensure that the College's data footprint is reliable, consistent, and of high quality and can be used for effective internal decision-making.

Among Dr. Hodge's proudest contributions has been participating in data reporting and studies to acquire the Aspen Prize recognition, which is one of the most prestigious awards for institutional effectiveness practices and excellence. Other significant contributions include assisting the college in gaining certification as an Achieving the Dream Leader College, as well as supporting many transformational projects and statewide initiatives.

Her contributions to WCCCD have been broad, and impactful, and she looks forward to exploring new data models and management systems that focus on developing student success initiatives. Her efforts continue to promote institutional research models to close the gap for underserved communities and advance educational attainment.






