



### **CAPITOL UPDATE**

Week Ending September 26, 2025

#### **Session Activity**

<u>The Governor's office</u>, along with House and Senate leaders, announced they have a deal for the FY 25-26 budget, which includes an approx \$1.8 billion road funding agreement that introduces a new 24% wholesale marijuana tax, dedicates all fuel tax revenues to road funding, and shifts SOAR funding to roads.

<u>House Bill 4108</u>, which passed 98-1, amends the Good Samaritan Act to grant civil liability protection to individuals who voluntarily administer bleeding control during emergencies.

Rep. Gina Johnsen's (R-Portland) <u>House Bill 4160</u>, passed 59-41 and would prohibit state departments from adopting or issuing a rule more stringent than federal standards unless there is clear and convincing evidence to do so.

#### **Committee Activity**

Senate Finance, Insurance and Consumer Protection heard testimony on <u>Senate Bill 543-550</u>, a package led by Chair Sen. Mary Cavanagh (D-Redford Twp.), which supporters argue seeks to ensure greater transparency and accountability in the insurance industry.

The House Judiciary Committee took up <u>House Bill 4840</u>, sponsored by Chair Rep. Sarah Lightner (R-Springport), which would require disputes among owners of privately held corporations to be handled in Michigan's business courts. Supporters note there are currently inconsistent standards in deciding whether such cases belong in business courts.

#### In Other News

- A DHHS study found the distribution of opioid settlement funds and the impact of 37 harm reduction agencies drastically cut overdose deaths and hospitalizations. Naloxone saved over 500 lives in 2024 and led to a 36% drop in overdose deaths. Since launching the Naloxone Direct Portal, Michigan has distributed 1.3 million kits and reversed nearly 34,000 overdoses.
- Macomb County Clerk Tony Forlini announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Secretary of State. He is the first Republican with election administration work experience to enter the race.
- The U.S. Department of Justice filed a lawsuit against the state of Michigan over its refusal to release voter registration lists, while SOS Jocelyn Benson continues to say she is complying with current law by keeping the records confidential.
- Michigan Department of Education data shows career and technical education (CTE) participation has grown over the past decade. In 2025, more than double the amount of students completed a CTE program compared to 2015 numbers.






