







Institutional Effectiveness

The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) continues to evaluate trends in community college focused on student success and enrollment. Education researchers continue to investigate dual enrollment and early middle college students to better understand their interests, needs and outcomes. Michigan dual enrollment students earned over 356,800 college credits in the last year. Below are data points comparing Michigan and U.S overall enrollment nationally and state-level representation.

Staff met to discuss plans for the upcoming Student Success workshop, the Holiday Luncheon, and prepare the Command Center for the Spring 2026 semester.






Phi Theta Kappa (PTK)






Career Education College Success Project
