






DOWNRIVER CAMPUS TOUR – Roosevelt High School Seniors

Division of Institutional Effectiveness


The Division of Institutional Effectiveness (IE) partners with the Division of Student Services and each campus to gather students' sense of belonging to promote satisfaction and engagement in campus life. IE analyzes student feedback gathered from a variety of surveys to understand their needs and improve experiences. Research suggests making a good first-time impression promotes engagement in campus life and indirectly enhances retention and completion. The Survey of Entering Student Engagement study reports that students having a sense of belonging fostered better overall success and retention.

A feeling of being welcome can help the student have:

- Improved Academic Outcomes. They tend to perform better academically.
- Increased Persistence and Enrollment, especially among first generation students.




















ST. FLORIAN CATHOLIC CHURCH Hamtramck, Michigan

St. Florian, the oldest church in Hamtramck and a designated heritage site in the United States, and is a symbol of Polish-American history and culture. With stunning stained glass windows, intricate gold work, and breathtaking architecture, the group was left in awe.

Sherry Washington

Sherry Washington serves as the arts curator and manager for the Wayne County Community College District Brown and Juanita C. Ford Galleries. She is responsible for ensuring that students and the community are exposed to some of the finest artworks in America. In 2023 she created the publication "American Visions: The Art of Collecting," which documents two 2022 exhibitions featured in the galleries.

Since 2003, the Brown and Juanita C. Ford Art Gallery has shown master artists such as Benny Andrews, Richard Mayhew, and David Driskell; as well as many esteemed local artists, emerging painters and K-12 artists. Ms. Washington is currently managing the publication of the Brown and Juanita C.

Ford Art Gallery exhibitions marketing project, "WCCCD Masters of the Arts" catalog," which features the art of renowned artists Harold Allen, M. Saffell Gardner, Bill Sanders, Jocelyn Rainey, and Jide Aje.

Ms. Washington has curated more than 60 exhibitions of American artists at WCCCD to ensure students and the community are aware of the value of incorporating the visual arts in one's life, thus hopefully improving one's quality of life. She has created two annual exhibitions that seek to unite WCCCD with the visual arts community: the "Annual K-12 Student Exhibition" and the "WCCCD Community Consciousness Exhibition." She also conducts youth workshops and lectures in the Brown and Juanita C. Ford Art Gallery that are taught by professional artists who provide hands-on experiences for participants.

In 1990 Ms. Washington and John Bolden created the Detroit Institute of Arts Friends of African and African American Art Dr. Alain Lock Awards. This award honors cultural leaders and artists who have significantly advanced appreciation and support for the arts in Michigan.

Ms. Washington is a University of Michigan graduate and a Delta Sigma Theta Sorority member. She is also a member of the Griots Book Club and the Elliottorian Business and Professional Women's Club. Since birth, she has been a member of the Historic Ebenezer AME Church.



The Detroit Association of Realtors, dedicated to advocating for private property rights and high professional standards, conducted a seminar at the Northwest Campus.






District-wide Health Sciences Meeting


