


Wayne State University Articulation Agreement



MIPSE also hosted the Downriver Hazardous Materials Response Team for their monthly proficiency training and material updates.









Virtual Intercultural Conversations



Shining the Light on... Dr. Tammy Anderson

Dr. Tammy Anderson is now entering her 35th year as an educator, having served as a college administrator, college professor, secondary teacher and K-12 principal. She began her career at WCCCD in 2016 at the Eastern Campus collecting data and creating reports for the Chancellor's leadership team, and she now serves as the District Associate Vice Chancellor of Student Services.

Dr. Anderson's contributions to WCCCD clearly show that she has been a tireless advocate for student success and institutional excellence. Her leadership has been instrumental in developing cross-campus programs for students focused on advising, retention, and college completion. She has always approached her work with a deep sense of care and advocacy for students.


All of these roles clearly underscore Dr. Anderson's long-standing commitment to our students and their success. She admits she loves her calling and is honored to serve our community and students.
