One major emphasis this week has been the revitalization of our council structure. The council structure is the District's primary mechanism for promoting teamwork, involvement and accountability among administrative groups. Examples of councils are the District Chief Academic Officers Council, Campus Presidents Council and the District Student Development Council. We are starting this re-vitalization process by working with four or five of the major administrative groups, and then will expand to involve other groups. A senior executive will be assigned to each group as an advisor and sponsor. Each council will be empowered to address operational and strategic matters within the specific area of responsibility, and to prepare recommendations to the Chancellor's Cabinet. The council structure will also assure broad participation in District decisions made on strategic and operational matters. Finally, we will encourage teamwork within each council and coordination among the councils. In addition to the professional development, participation and teamwork objectives that will be achieved, we expect that the council structure will expedite problem solving and decision-making processes. We will be making the further development of these councils a priority in the months ahead.

The Downriver Campus hosted the second annual Global Education Day on Saturday. The keynote speaker was Hilda Rwabazair Paqui, a native of Uganda, East Africa and Assistant Director of the United Nations Development Programs Communications Office. The event included international storytelling, ethnic dancing from around the world, arts and crafts, and a taste fest. More than 600 people of all ages throughout the region attended the event. David C. Butty acted as Master of Ceremony and Dr. Randall Miller welcomed the attendees to the event.

On Tuesday, Dr. Janet Dettloff, Tony Arminiak, Mike Dotson and I were guests of the Grosse Pointe Sunrise Rotary Club at the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club. The purpose of this appearance was to update members on the status of equipment purchases and renovation projects as outlined at the last Board of Trustees meeting. Over thirty members of the Rotary Club representing health care, education, local governments and various for were present to hear the presentation and ask questions. The group was very appreciative of the information and it was indicated that they would welcome future updates from the District as well as a chance to tour some of the District's facilities.

The Faculty Institute on Teaching, Learning, and Distance Education has tabulated results from the Teaching, Learning, and Technology Survey distributed on Faculty Organization Day. There were 93 respondents. The majority of faculty who responded were part time (63%) and have taught at the District less than 5 years (32%) or more than 26 years (26%). They are relatively unfamiliar with using computer technologies for teaching and learning. Most have never taught a Distance Education course (85%) or used computer technologies in classroom teaching (65%). Yet, they are interested in learning how to use computer technologies in their teaching as well as developing their ability to use selected teaching tools and strategies. They would "very likely" attend workshops on the following subjects (selected results in order of frequency):

- 1) Using computer technologies in a face-to-face class
- 2) Employing active learning strategies
- 3) Teaching students with different learning styles
- 4) Learning from faculty colleagues who have used computer technologies
- 5) Posting a syllabus in Blackboard
- 6) Designing animation, video, and audio presentations for an online course
- 7) Facilitating effective group work

In addition to providing workshops that meet faculty interests, the Faculty Institute can support teaching and learning by providing reference material on a campus website (73% of respondents) and by providing an online course to develop courses in Blackboard (53% of respondents).

- On Wednesday, I met with Detroit Police Chief Jerry Oliver, in an effort to continue our dialogue on ways in which to improve relationships and partnership between the Detroit Police Department and the District. Our talks also centered on ways to provide a safe environment for our students and the community as a whole.
