On Monday, we broke ground for our \$5.5 million Public Safety Training Facility at the Downriver Campus. Over 150 people, including state legislators, municipal mayors, and Downriver school superintendents witnessed this historic event. It was the first groundbreaking for a capital project in over 20 years. Attendees viewed architectural renderings of the new project and participated in the symbolic tossing of the soil. The Truman High School Band played celebratory music for the event.

The U.S. Department of Education has approved the following non-degree programs for financial aid eligibility:

- Radio/Television Technology
- Architectural Construction Technology
- Registered Social Work
- Facility Maintenance
- Industrial Computer Graphics Technology
- Pharmacy Technology
- Surgical First Assistant
- Nursing Assistant

Students enrolled in these programs, if eligible, may use financial aid to cover tuition and fees up to the amount of the financial aid award.

This week, the nursing faculty and some dental faculty were trained in the Worldwide Instructional Development System (WIDS). This allows faculty to produce a syllabus, which has specific outcomes and a customized assessment tool. This system addresses accountability not only on the part of the student but also the instructor. This system also promotes consistency across all campuses where the course is taught. This activity was sponsored by the State and was delivered at the Western Campus. A follow up session is planned for March.
