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We were pleased today to host the second Great Leadership Conference at the Downtown Campus featuring several outstanding presenters. Joining us were colleagues from our sister community colleges including Henry Ford, Washtenaw, Oakland, and Owens (Toledo, OH), universities, K-12 systems, members of the business community, corporate sector, public officials, and community leaders. With a focus on effective strategies for managing high performance organizations, participants heard approaches and advice from Dr. Christa Adams, president of Owens Community College, and Ron Dzwonkowski, editorial page editor for the *Detroit Free Press*. The keynote address was given by Dr. Marshall Goldsmith, executive coach, speaker, and author of the bestseller *What Got You Here Won't Get You There*. A panel discussion led by Dr. Christine McPhail allowed a critical forum to exchange strategies and ideas for enhancing organization performance.

More than 100 members from the Downriver communities gathered at the Downriver Campus for a luncheon to inform constituents of the many changes happening in the region and throughout the District. John Bolden, Martha Grier, Michael Dotson, and Tony Arminiak spoke to the attendees about the progress at the Downriver Campus including the status of the Heinz C. Prechter Educational and Performing Arts Center, remodeling of science laboratories, computer upgrades, new and expanded academic and technical programs. Also attending were Trustees Charles Paddock and Alan Anderson. Dr. George Swan, Dr. Nick Fleezanis, Kim DiCaro, and Dr. Gunder Myran were also on hand to provide updates about the District for attendees. Representatives from the public and private sectors complimented staff on the comprehensive format and informative nature of the program. It was well-received by all.

- ◆ Did you know that WCCCD is currently in Phase 3 of the HLC re-accreditation? This phase is a two-year comprehensive evaluation. The Self-Study Steering Committee will lead supportive evidence collection, review, and preparation for the Self-Study Report and develop supplemental materials for Self-Study consultant/evaluators during their visit in 2010.

EDUCATIONAL AFFAIRS

- ◆ The Tech Prep Long Range plans for Regions 25 (Monroe) and 24 (Detroit Public Schools) were signed and submitted to Lansing for funding.

DISTANCE LEARNING

- ◆ The division recently hosted "Tech" Friday. Participants received theoretical insight on podcasting, used the Wimba podcasting tool available through the District's Blackboard system, and created podcasts that were immediately available for use.
- ◆ Dr. Stephanie Bulger attended the Michigan Community College Virtual Learning Collaborative Advisory Committee meeting in Lansing. Members discussed the 2008-2012 Strategic Plan. Other topics included the facilitation and sharing of scarce resources, increased opportunities for global education, developing the capacity to implement an applied baccalaureate program, and leveraging strategic partnerships.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

- ◆ Mike Dotson, Michael Blair, and Felisa Ware met with the Eastside Advisory Council. The group provided the council with updates on the Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods Campus Center, Eastern Campus, and the new University Center scheduled to open during the Fall 2008 Semester. The center will be located at 19305 Vernier Road across from Eastland Mall in the former Beacon East Theater and will have six university partners offering a variety of undergraduate and graduate degree programs.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

- ◆ Students and trainers from St. Clair College of Windsor attended sessions at the Michigan Institute for Public Safety Education for fire brigade training. The trainees practiced hose and ladder techniques as well as high angle and search and rescue.
- ◆ A town hall meeting on "Underage Drinking" was held at the Downtown Campus. A distinguished panel representing parents, teachers, and community leaders interacted with youth and adults about the perils of underage drinking and possible solutions to the problem. The event was held in partnership with the Development Centers, Inc. of Detroit.

CAMPUS PRESIDENTS' CORNER

- ◆ The Western Campus partnered with the Michigan Coalition of Black Farmers to host "Planting Seeds for the Future: Farming for Economic Development Forum." Participants discussed the economics of the farming community and learned ways to improve their training and marketing programs.
- ◆ The Downriver Campus participated in the annual Southern Wayne County Regional Chamber and the News-Herald Business and Lifestyle Exposition. The District's allied health programs were featured. More than 5,000 people attended the three-day event.

- ◆ Bonike Odegbami, Felisa Ware, and Temi Nuga attended a meeting of the Detroit Rotary Club. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration Detroit office provided members with a presentation on its function and impact in Detroit.

- ◆ Former WCCCD students and Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) members Jocelyn Brown, Cheryl Glidden, and Carl Farrington were among the honorees at Marygrove College's recent annual Honors Convocation. Ms. Brown, current PTK president and dual enrollment student at WCCCD and Marygrove College, was the recipient of four awards while Ms. Glidden received three awards. Mr. Farrington, WCCCD's 2006 graduation class speaker and graduating senior at Marygrove College, was the recipient of eight awards and scholarships, including the Distinguished Student Award.
